Commander Joel D. McMillan, USN

Cmdr McMillan is the Navy Staff Engineer for the Engineering Division (J42) in the Directorate of Logistics and Engineering (J4) at North American Aerospace Defense Command and United States Northern Command. He advocates for military engineering support to NORAD and USNORTHCOM through technical advances and critical infrastructure advisement.

Prior to this assignment, he was the Director of the Navy Contracting Office - Somalia, coordinating life and facility support through contract vehicles to U.S. forces operating in Somalia.

After commissioning from Officer Candidate School in 1999, his Navy assignments began with Public Works Center, San Diego where he became the Division Officer for the Point Loma Self –Help.

In 2002 he reported to Naval Facilities Engineering Command Atlantic Division as an intern architect. Then serving as a company commander, he deployed wth Naval Mobile Construction Battalion Three to Okinawa, Guam and the Philippines.

In 2005, he reported aboard Submarine Base New London as a construction manager and assistant public works officer. While serving in Groton, he deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom,

assigned as the Officer in Charge of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers construction office in Camp Taji, Iraq.

In 2007, he relocated to Naples, Italy as NAVFAC's Contingency Engineer Business Line Leader across Europe, Africa and Southwest Asia. After graduate school, he reported to Walter Reed National




Military Medical Center, serving temporarily as assistant resident officer in charge of construction until he joined the Afghanistan Pakistan Hands program in 2012, deploying to Kabul in 2013 as an advisor to Afghanistan's Ministry of Rural Rehabilitation and Development. In 2014, he served as a senior engineer in the U.S. Agency for International Development in the Office of American Schools and Hospitals Abroad. In 2015, he deployed again to Kabul, this time as both the Deputy Engineer for NATO and the Strategic Basing Officer. In 2017 he assumed the duty as the Public Works Officer of Naval Support Activity in Crane, Indiana.

He holds a Bachelor of Architecture from Illinois Tech, a Masters in Urban Planning from the University of Washington and a Masters in Strategic Studies from the U.S. Army War College. He is a Seabee Combat Warfare Officer, a Joint Qualified Officer, a member of the acquisition professional community and a registered architect in Colorado.

His personal awards include Meritorious Service Medals, Joint Service Commendation Medals, Navy Commendation Medals, an Army Commendation Medal and a Navy Achievement Medal.

USS Colorado Update

In May four crew members of USS Colorado paid a four-day visit to the state. The group included Commanding Officer Justin Reeves, Chief of the Boat Chris Goss, MMN2 Thomas Pickett and Longmont native ITE1 Andy Fischer. The visit was arranged and hosted by USS Colorado Submarine Association.

On Sunday May 11th the schedule kicked off with a dinner at the Aquarian Restaurant in Denver hosted by members of the Association.


On Monday, the crew visited the Adams County Veterans Memorial at Riverdale Regional Park where they were hosted by officials from Adams County. From there it was on to the Capitol for a meeting with Governor Jared Polis and a tour of the Capitol. They then visited History Colorado where they received a behind-the-scenes tour of some of the military artifacts in the museum's collections.

On Tuesday, the group visited Fort Collins, where they started with an interview on Pirate 93.5 Radio before giving a presentation to the JROTC students at Poudre High School. They toured Old Town Fort Collins and visited the Fort Collins Rotary Club for lunch and a presentation. In the afternoon they had a short tour of the Horse and Dragon Brewery followed by a presentation at Fossil Ridge High School and then dinner at the New Belgium Brewery.

The group spent Wednesday in Colorado Springs. In the morning, they visited Cogitic Corporation, a manufacturer of critical submarine parts. They received a briefing and tour of the facility, viewing the sophisticated machinery used in the manufacture of these precision parts. They had lunch with the Colorado Springs Rotary Club where they gave a presentation about the boat to attendees. In the afternoon they visited Garden of the Gods followed by dinner at the Golden Bee Restaurant.

Thursday saw the group visit Saddle Ranch Elementary School in Highlands Ranch to give a presentation to about 150 students in the 4th, 5th and 6th grades. After that they headed to Arvada to tour Barber-Nichols Corporation, another Colorado critical submarine parts manufacturer. It was great to see crew members interact effectively with company employees. In the afternoon, the group received a tour of Bronco Stadium before heading to Sloan's Lake Park. There they met members of the local U.S. Submarine Veterans Rocky Mountain Base who hosted them on a visit to the USS Grayling (SS 209) Memorial. GRAYLING was one of the fifty-two U.S. submarines lost during World War II. Afterwards all headed to dinner at Sloan's Lake Brewhouse. This was the last event of their visit before their return flight to Hawaii the next morning.

It was an honor to host the crew members in Colorado once again and have them meet and interact with Coloradans.

Cadets also visited the National Museum of WW II Aviation. This is the only museum in the world to focus exclusively on the unique story of the role of aviation in WW II. This powerful educational experience also deepened cadets' understanding of the sacrifices and heroism of the Greatest Generation.

Back by popular demand, the cadets spent the night at the Academy Hotel, which fostered team-building and relaxation after a full day of activities. The next morning brought a delicious breakfast buffet and a hike in Garden of the Gods. Surrounded by stunning red rock formations, cadets enjoyed a scenic and invigorating hike through one of Colorado's most iconic landscapes.

Also during May's drill, two summer training scholarships were awarded. Both PO2 Adam Van Arsdall and PO2 Mason Spanos submitted excellent scholarship applications and Sea Cadet leadership is proud to announce that both were awarded the prestigious Retired Navy Commander Len Deemer Scholarship. The scholarship helped support their participation in advanced training this summer. Both traveled to Wisconsin, where Van Arsdall performed Coast Guard Maritime Interdiction Training, and Spanos trained n field operations. Both cadets demonstrated their dedication and excellence.

Another favorite summer activity involves rafting along the Clear Creek River. In June, guides from AVA Rafting helped Sea Cadets navigate Class IV rapids. On May 7, 2025 Denver Council members Chris Schutzenberger and Ed Duffett joined about 75 other participants in Washington, D.C. for the Navy League Annual Fly-In. They arrived in D.C. on the evening of May 6th for a briefing from headquarters and then the team descended on Capitol Hill early the next morning to meet with Congressional offices. The briefing presentation, developed by Navy League headquarters, highlighted the Navy League's legislative requests on behalf of the Sea Services for this session of Congress.




